

April Program

At the next Master Gardeners of Davidson County meeting on Thursday, April 10th, at 6:30pm, Alan Powell will present "Rediscovering Eden."

"Rediscovering Eden" is meant to remind us that Eden was never destroyed, and remains around us to this day. We simply need to reconnect with it, and realize it can still enrich our lives in many ways, not least of which is to provide delicious, nutritious, and free food to supplement our meals. Many of the plants referred to as weeds are abundant and more nutrient dense than cultivated foods. Alan also discusses how knowledge that was once common to all people has largely disappeared from our culture and what led to this forgetting.

Alan has been teaching about edible plants for about eight years. It is one among several primitive skills he studies, including fire-making with a bow drill, cordage and rope-making using native plants, basic shelter skills, and finding clean drinking water.

He has also been the CSA coordinator for Jeff Poppen, the Barefoot Farmer, for the past eight years. This provided an entrance to the local food scene in Nashville. He now serves on the Nashville Food Policy Council, and is co-founder of Nashville Grown, a 'food hub' that aggregates food from more than 30 local farms, making access easier for local restaurants and caterers.

Alan has a degree from Berklee College of Music in Boston, and has been teaching private guitar, as well as playing in bands, doing studio work, and playing classical guitar at weddings and private functions.

To paraphrase that old adage: "Plan your garden twice dig just once." So before we start digging in compost, raking up last fall's leaves, and pruning the Cherokee rose, the Weedin' Women of Belle Meade decided to hold a planning meeting for 2014. And because part of the fun of being a Weedin' Woman is food and fellowship, we had a breakfast meeting on March 19th at Le Peep. Great omelets and just a stone's throw from the garden. Perfect!

We started by making a list of the plants that may need replacing after this harsh winter—a much longer list than we'd like. Rosemary, boxwoods, and lavender all succumbed to the cold, so we'll be hitting the PPS Plant Sale and the Herb Society sale in early April for replacements.

Next, we reviewed the seed purchases for this year. In addition to the Cherokee Purple and Yellow Pear tomatoes Catherine Atwell has started, we have heirloom seeds on hand for Rat's Tail radishes, Scarlet Nantes carrots, Cherokee Train and Kentucky Wonder beans, Bull Nose and Fish peppers, and Purple Top turnips. We're also adding in a few Love Lies Bleeding (amaranthus) for some summer color.

We plan to start working on Wednesdays in April, starting at 9am while the weather is cool. Come join us and share the excitement of another year in the garden. We especially hope that members of the new class will come and experience spring at Belle Meade.

Historic Nashville City Cemetery

Our cold February limited our Boxwood Trimming Demonstration at the Nashville City Cemetery to only one Saturday. Cold notwithstanding, we did have great attendance of Master Gardeners, Interns and interested gardeners from the public.

Boxwood is a popular, easy to grow evergreen shrub that is found in many gardens. It has only one major annual need for maintenance thinning. English and American Boxwood have very dense growth habits and lends itself beautifully for hedges and accent plantings.

It is very important to maintain annual thinning to bring light and air into the interior of the plant and encourage the growth of new foliage within the canopy. The best time to thin Boxwood is February and March. If you carefully bend the branches back, you can see that the foliage is growing only on the outermost reaches of the branches. This severely reduces air circulation and favors the development of diseases. To thin, use a bypass pruner that is sharp and the blade has been cleaned with alcohol. Reach inside the shrub about 6-inches and prune on the stem. Continue thinning until the small interior twigs just start to be come visible. You should remove about ten percent of the outer branches.

After proper thinning, small voids appear in the canopy that permit air and sunlight to enter the interior of the shrub where older leaves are now visible. After about two or three years of annual thinning, a new growth will start to appear in the interior portion of the shrub. This results in a healthy plant with strong stems. You can now use your larger trimmers to shape your shrub (Note: do <u>not</u> use electric trimmers). Plan to join us next year at the City Cemetery to learn more about Boxwood Trimming.

Recipe of the Month

Ingredients:

- ▶ 2 (8-oz.) packages cream cheese
- ▶ 1 package Ranch dressing
- ▶ 2-3 green onions (use the whole onion, chopped and diced)
- ▶ ½ c red pepper, diced
- ▶ 1 can black olives, diced (jumbo olives packed in water are easiest to dice)
- ▶ 12-inch tortilla (soft flour)

Instructions:

Combine softened cream cheese, Ranch dressing and green onions. Spread on tortilla shells. Sprinkle other ingredients. Roll up. Wrap in plastic wrap and refrigerate overnight, or at least 2 hours before slicing. These slice best when cold. Cut in about 1½-inch sections to serve.
